Stem Cell Research After January 20?

Studying your craft is one of the best ways to improve your sales. Here's a reminder about the Free Conference the Northwest Arkansas Writers Workshop will hold this spring, where you can learn more about the business of writing.

I hope you've already marked your calendars for our group's free conference. The schedule and complete information follows this article. Make sure to register if you're coming. We'd hate you to have to sit on the floor.

I've been very busy since returning from San Antonio where I picked up an award in the creative non - fiction category. My book, Fly With The Mourning Dove was a finalist.

I also pitched some book ideas and came home with two contracts and a third in negotiations. So that means nose to the grindstone (oops, a cliche, but my nose is sore) in order to finish the first two books. All contracts are with small publishers, and I can't stress enough the importance of checking out the many small publishers who may have the right spot for your book. Not only are they great to work with, they are out there marketing and promoting their books.

The two books, neither of which have a title yet, are respectively about the lost communities of the Boston Mountains with Old American Publishing and recipes and stories from the Boston Mountains with GoldMinds Publishing. The two will mesh very well, though they are with different publishers. I'm already exploring promotional ideas for the two as a pair.

The third book is in the wings and I won't say much about it until contract is signed, but I'm very excited about it as well.

I'm available during the coming year for workshops, so if your group is the looking for someone to do some teaching or speaking, I'm experienced in the fields. I'm also thinking about holding a retreat here in our lovely Boston Mountains of Arkansas, if enough people show an interest in taking part, but more about that next time.
