The two new board members elected were Eric Underhill to Position 3 and J. R. Wood to Position 4.

After the annual meeting the regular monthly meeting was held. Discussion included repairs to one of the trucks with possibility of same problem with another truck, battery for AED for Station 3, and a feasibility study for one of two methods being considered of enhancing the range and strengthening the signal for the radios both for faster response time and communications in the field.

The June Board Meeting will be the second Thursday, June 12th at 7:00 PM. They will reorganize the board and elect new officers at that meeting.

New heat pumps have been installed replacing the ones stolen a few months ago from the Old School Building housing the Winslow Library and Friends of the Library Used Book Store. Surveillance cameras have been installed both inside and outside of the building. Inside they cover the hallway from all angles and the same with the library. Outside cameras are installed to cover all four sides of the building. It's sad that the city has to go to these measures and expense, spending about \$4500.00 to replace what was stolen and protect it from further incidents.

Robert Runyan – Recipient of 2014 "Living Treasure" Award

The Arkansas Arts Council awarded the 2014 "Living Treasure" Award to Robert Runyan of Winslow in recognition of his skill in hand-built log cabin/house structures and stone masonry. He was honored at a very well attended reception held at the Shiloh Museum on Thursday, May 14, 2014.



Robert and his small crew of craftsmen build each log house using



a 700-800 year old method called "Scandinavian Full-Scribe" in which each timber is honed out to exactly fit the log beneath it. Over time each log settles even cozier into the one below adding stability and weather tightness to the log house. This is also known as an "over-scribed-method" using no chinking, caulking or extra thick gaskets between the logs.

According to Robert an average size log house can take up to 2 years to complete. The majority of the work is done with hand tools similar to those used in the 1800's.

The same is true of his rock work. Each rock

is shaped to match the rocks around it. I remember being fascinat-



ed when he was doing the rock work on what was the Mountain Top Store run by the Willyards about the early 80's.

Each year since 2002 the Arkansas Arts Council has presented the "Living Treasure" award recognizing an outstanding craftsperson whose ability has contributed to the preservation of a traditional craft or art form.

The Cavern

In the "mural room", I asked myself over and over if these scenes weren't true, what possessed this Indian culture to pain such events. These are not made-up legends, they tell stories of events. For example, wooden boat appears in one scene adorned with iron. A huge man appears sporting a white-golden beard, as do others in the boat. Undoubtedly, the scene does not take place in NW Arkansas but trade seems to be trading beads and ornaments for tools and weapons.

In other scenes Indians are actually burying parts of their dead. In the same room two pyramid structures appear, some four feet at their bases, approximately six to eight feet apart, some ten feet in height and adorned with various trinkets. Clay pottery also exist, quills of birds and broken-up (decayed) turtle shell upon stacked rock.

In another scene, what appears to be an Indian of scholar. It, though somewhat faded, appears to be a book in his right hand and a quill in his left. Other adults (men) are seated as if being taught. Two letters of our own alphabet stand out vividly, "A" and "Q", but no language is written by any letters. The turtle is vivid in all murals.

Through the years I've kept journal I've written concerning this existence, but never needed them. It seems to be instilled in my mind, except the exact location of my initial discovery of entry. There is another entrance, but a good eight miles from the rooms of interest. Dark corridors exist throughout this route.

Two things stuck in my mind upon entry. No bats whatsoever, no bear tracks within the entire structure, also not one snake, 'course that did not hurt my feelings. The "Pond Room" has a thin opening of sunlight during the day on the south east side, with twinkling sunlight from up above, scattered. The middle of the pond may be bottomless and is dark emerald green. Gravel and sand appear around the perimeter, which is arched to a wall of rock with that thin opening of light. Rushing water sounds are heard beneath the floor in one room.

If man knows of this concern, undoubtedly it has not been revealed. I cannot imagine the Government or scientists not knowing of this existence, not with our technology today. Yet, no footsteps appear except for mine and four others throughout the area. I suppose it is possible to not know as man discovers new species and possibilities each day of any given time zone. Hallelujah!

There appears to be some watermarks alongside the walls but they also appear to be ancient. A shark's tooth is embedded in one huge rock extending from wall. Fossils appear in various rocks. Soil and rock are different in nature at different heights of the "Pond Room". Another room has rocks extending from one wall and could have been sculpted by man. They resemble three huge chairs. One in the center is larger than the other two which are positioned one on each side of the largest.

Not far from this cavern lies an old cave. Two people from Winslow explored this cave many years ago. It also extends out some eight or nine miles but is treacherous. A man would have to be thin in stature to explore this cave, mighty thin. Several trails not followed could possibly lead into the cavern; I do not know. This cave exists on the Eastern side of a major thoroughfare off the" beaten path". One entrance is off to the side of a walking trail, the opening in the side of a nearby knoll.

Personally, I don't believe at this interval the cavern will be exploited. The person or persons that eventually will find it, will be people that will step –up to the plate. An extra step of stamina will also be needed. The sun still rises in the East, does it not? Yet, if a person can step sideways on a path about a foot wide standing upon that path on a NW side of a hill, they might actually see a covered entrance to something. The covering will resemble a three foot triangular rock, thin in structure. From the path is a good bit of yardage across the valley floor. A good GPS might come in handy.

Though no bears have entered the cavern, bear are plentiful through the area of concern, as are snakes. Rocky regions lie within! Hallelujah!

Safety throughout this adventure is a must effort...(hidden wells exist...) It is against the law to enter caves.

WEST FORK OF THE WHITE RIVER CLEANUP

On Saturday May 17, the Beaver Watershed Alliance supervised a cleanup of the West Fork, from Winslow to the city of West Fork. Several folks from Winslow participated, taking trash from the river and its banks around here.

At the lunch which followed at Riverside Park in West Fork—attended by about one hundred participants from all over the area-Beaver Watershed Alliance President John Pennington recognized Winslow as the most active in the area because of its new rain garden at the ball park pavilion (helped by 4H children), the erosion control plantings along the West Fork in Peek's Park downtown, and its participation in the river cleanup.

An exciting project concerning Beaver Lake and its watershed is afoot in Northwest Arkansas. The popular and award-winning folk duo Still on the Hill is writing and recording an entire CD to create awareness about the lake's history and collective stories.
