"Sicko"

If anyone has missed seeing Michael Moore's recent release, "Sicko," try to see it. That is, if you don't mind being furious for about one and a half hours. The show is about health care and especially the cost of it in other countries as compared to America.

Another Moore presentation about the terrorist attack on 9/11 and the war in Iraq received split reviews. It was speculated that he was trying to shift all the blame to the CIA to get Bush off the hook, and I thought that might be true, at least to some extent. But after seeing Sicko, I decided Moore was never trying to shift the blame off of anyone. He is for real and exposes things about America's health care system that most people don't know.

Moore ventured to other countries, starting with Canada, and stopped people on the street. He asked what they thought about their health care coverage, which is paid for by the government; none of them had any problem with the program.

He went on to other countries including England and France, which have similar health care systems, and asked people from all walks of life if they were satisfied with health care in their country. Moore admitted being laughed at because the questions he asked were serious to him but ridiculous to people who had always had health care provided by the government.

They couldn't understand 46 million people being without health care and hospitals turning people away for lack of insurance. They surely couldn't comprehend sick people staying at home and dying rather than going to the doctor simply because they were unable to afford a doctor, or, as we understand very well, could not afford to live.

We have forever been led to believe that our hospitals, our highly trained doctors and our high-tech equipment are the best in the world; but with all propaganda aside, how do we measure up to other countries?

I just mentioned Cuba, and I don't remember the exact count but there is a higher rate of infant fatality in the US than in the supposedly underdeveloped Cuba; but that seems to be the case everywhere. The bottom line of how effective a country's health care system is would be the age of life expectancy.

I'm afraid we cannot expect to live as long as residents in a number of other countries. The life expectancy in England, Spain and Canada is 3% higher than in the US. I'm sure there are all kinds of explanations, but the fact remains that they outlive us because they have better health care. Problems started a long time ago when our country went lawsuit crazy, and insurance companies started raising rates because they were getting stuck for millions. Corporate greed was the icing on the cake, and there doesn't seem to be any end.

If Obama does anything at all toward improving health care, it will be more than the last 16 years of Clinton and Bush. They did nothing but sit back and watch it go out of sight.

Greenland School District

Greenland Public Schools Are Schools Of Choice

All Arkansas School Districts are required to advertise to parents and students the availability of school choice. Applications under the "Arkansas Public School Choice Act" for non-residents to attend Greenland from another school district must be submitted to the Greenland School District not later than July 1. The Superintendent will provide written notice to the parent or guardian, and the student's resident district of the decision to accept or reject the application within 30 days of receipt of the application. The primary purpose of coming to or leaving any school district should not be to participate in athletics.

Greenland will not accept out-of-district students who have been expelled from another school or students needing services not currently provided.

The Greenland Community has affirmed its Choice. In the last year:

- 1. A school tax increase was passed that provides increased revenues but still keeps taxes very competitive.
- 2. A new \$1,000,000 bond was passed for re-roofing at Greenland High School and the purchase of school busses.
- 3. A City of Greenland Sales Tax was passed with only 28 "no" votes that provides revenues to the Greenland School District for two years.
- 4. A Save Our School committee has raised over \$85,000 for the
- 5. Alumni have formed an Educational Foundation for the future.
- 6. Athletic Booster, Band Booster, and Parent Teacher Organizations remain active in support of a variety of activities for children.
- 7. Parents, alumni, and community members are very involved in the schools with three generations at many activities.
- 8. A Winslow leadership group and the Greenland Superintendent are working on plans to open the Winslow gymnasium next fall for community activities as well as after-school academic assistance to students enrolled in the Greenland Schools.
- 9. The School District cherishes the traditions of the communities of Greenland and Winslow. Parents, volunteers, teachers, coaches, sponsors, and administrators have one common goal: Student Success.

San Diego County Officials Shut Down Home Bible Study County Official Interrogates Pastor And His Wife

A San Diego pastor and his wife have been told they cannot have a Bible study in their home. The couple says they were interrogated by a San Diego County official, then threatened with ever increasing fines if they refuse to stop the Bible study. (See news article here)

According to the couple's attorney, they were questioned about the Bible study. "'Do you have a regular meeting in your home?" The pastor's wife replied, "Yes." "Do you say 'amen'?" the official asked. "Yes," she replied. "Do you pray?" Again she said, "Yes." "Do you say 'praise the Lord'?" Another "Yes." The official told the pastor and his wife they were in violation of county rules.

A few days later they got a written warning that listed the home Bible study an "unlawful use of land." They were notified to "stop religious assembly or apply for a major use permit," which could cost them thousands of dollars.

Any family or household that already has cable TV or lives under an active portion of Cox cable have access to hi-speed through Cox Communications. Their basic Internet service would add \$26.99 per month to the cable bill. This is a 1.5 Mbps connection.

CenturyTel DSL is a viable option for anyone within an 18,000-foot radius (approx. 3 miles) of the phone office near the school gym. It is not available if you live on the "other" side of one of the mini offices such as the one at the top of Carter Lane or North of Winslow on 71 near the old cafe. (But you can call and keep bugging them to see if they can make it possible!) A 512 kbps speed will cost \$31.20 per month.

A few other options available to some Winslow area households are: Cellular service through any number of cellphone providers, wireless line of sight broadband, and satellite broadband. These are generally more expensive and have their limitations. Satellite usually has what is called a "Fair Access Policy" which doesn't necessarily limit the amount of time but the amount of material you download. For general use this is not usually a problem. Wireless radio requires you to have a line of sight to one of their towers. Cellular coverage will work only where you get a good strong cell signal and will not work with older operating systems such as Windows 2000 or Windows 98SE.

Sometimes bundles are available for a cost savings with cable, phone, or cellular. We save approximately \$20.00 to \$25.00 per month over our old separate phone, ISP, and cable bills. I have included a table with the basic comparisons and a list of the most likely candidates for ISP service in our area. There are no taxes, tariffs, or access fees included in the prices listed below. This is not an exhaustive list and is in no order of preference.
