LOGIC 2000
Dealing with Cancer

Steven Ransom reported that 67 percent of patients who die during treatment do so because their immune systems fail after being disabled by chemotherapy. He concluded: "Put simply, chemotherapy is an intravenously administered poison that kills all living matter."

Cancer specialist Professor Charles Mathe declared: "If I contracted cancer, I would never go to a standard cancer treatment center. Cancer victims who live far from such centers have a chance."

The Professor didn't need to be more specific than that. He was referring to people who live in remote locations or in places outside the reach of the cancer mafia, who have a chance to live. Cancer Inc. advertises and makes a big deal out of the few who are tough enough to survive and say nothing about terrifying statistics and all the ones who didn't make it.

Allen Levin, MD, UCSF, author of *The Healing of Cancer* wrote:

"Most cancer patients in this country die of chemotherapy. Chemotherapy does not eliminate breast, colon, or lung cancers. This fact has been documented for over a decade, [two decades now] yet doctors still use chemotherapy for these tumors."

Why do they still use chemotherapy Dr. Levin? I think he knows why --- Money! The highly organized cancer mob is estimated to rake in over \$200 billion per year, and that figure was arrived at about six years ago.

Walter Last, writing in *The Ecologist* reported:

"After analyzing cancer survival statistics for several decades, Dr. Hardin Jones, a professor at the University of California concluded: ...'patients are as well, or better off, untreated.' Jones' disturbing assessment has never been refuted."

Notice that it wasn't my conclusion that Professor Hardin Jones' "assessment has never been refuted."

According to Pat Rattigan ND:

"The cancer research fund-raisers' definition of cancer cure is the apparent lack of symptoms for five years. If, or when, the patient dies, a year or two after the five years, from the effects of the treatment, they remain in the 'cure statistics:' cured and dead at the same time."

Ransom reported:

"Dr Dean Burk, the former head of the Cytochemistry Department of the National Cancer Institute ... had personally worked on vitamin B-17. 'When we add laetrile [B-17] to a cancer culture under the microscope,' said Dr Burk, 'providing the enzyme glucosidase also is present, we can see cancer cells dying off like flies.'

Dr Ralph Moss, former assistant director of public affairs at the Sloan-Kettering Cancer Institute in Manhattan, after being advised by the elderly Japanese scientist, Kanematsu Sugiura, that "laetrile was dramatically effective in stopping the spread of cancer," formed his own conclusions and was asked in an interview by Laura Lee:

"So this is verified, that laetrile can have this positive effect?"

Dr Moss replied, "We were finding this and yet in Public Affairs were told to issue statements to the exact opposite of what we were finding scientifically."

Dr Moss was fired the next day. They couldn't have their money-making empire destroyed by someone giving in to things as outdated as the truth and something as immature as feeling guilty about sending countless people to an early grave.

"Many medical oncologists recommend chemotherapy for virtually any tumor, with a hopefulness undiscounted by almost invariable failure." (Albert Braverman, MD, "Medical Oncology in the 90s," *Lancet* 1991, vol. 337, p. 901).

I think Dr. Braverman easily recognized that while chemotherapy will likely fail to keep anybody alive, it doesn't fail to pad oncologists' bank accounts. People dying by the thousands are sort of unfortunate but can be overlooked as long as the real objective of gathering suitcases of loot is accomplished.

Thomas Dao, MD, *New England Journal of Medicine* wrote:

"Despite widespread use of chemotherapies, breast cancer mortality has not changed in the last 70 years." That is regrettable because there is no change in sight. If we go by past performance, women will continue to trust their oncologist and will not believe that it is all a fraud.

Hence, their high death rate will continue unchanged. William Campbell Douglass MD, analyzed the new 3-D mammograms in the Internet distributed Daily Dose Digest, which he titled "Dangerous new mammograms" on March 4, 2011. He pointed out that the machine sends out twice as much radiation with no more than 7 percent greater efficiency. He wrote:

"...it just puts millions of women through unnecessary, life-altering treatments such as poisonous drugs, toxic chemo, and disfiguring breast-chopping surgeries." He continues:

"The new machine won't change that -- it'll make it worse, because increased 'accuracy' is just code for increased paychecks, as doctors spot even more harmless tumors to perform unnecessary treatments on."

MENOPAUSE

What is menopause and how it affects women. This is a serious condition and even though a lot of fun is made at the women's expense it is far from fun. I thought if everyone was educated there would be more understanding of the family and more support because it is hard on every one.

Natural menopause occurs when:

Your ovaries naturally stop producing the hormones estrogen and progesterone. You go 12 consecutive months without having a period. No other biological or physiological cause can explain explain the missed periods.

Surgical menopause:

Begins immediately after surgery to remove both ovaries. This may be part of a total hysterectomy or bilateral oophorectomy. The sudden estrogen loss may quickly lead to many of the same menopausal symptoms that women face in natural menopause, like hot flashes, night sweats and vaginal symptoms. For some women, those symptoms can be more severe than those experienced through natural menopause.

When does menopause begin?

Menopause begins at different times for different women, but most can expect it between the ages of 45 and 55. Whether you have reached menopause naturally or it has occurred due to surgical removal of the uterus and ovaries (called a hysterectomy and bilateral oophorectomy) this loss of estrogen can result in a variety of physical symptoms.

A transition in 3 stages:

During this time of your life, your body usually moves through three gradual stages, unless your menopause is surgery related, which ends the cycle immediately.

Peri-menopause:

Peri-menopause is the time when estrogen production from your ovaries starts to decline and symptoms such as erratic periods, hot flashes, and vaginal dryness may begin. Most women reach this stage of the process in their late 40's.

Menopause:

Menopause is identified by the passing of your final menstrual period. Of course, you will not be able to pinpoint your final period until you've been completely free from menstruation for some time. Once you've gone a full 12 months without having your period, count back to the time of your last period and that date is the date of your menopause. While the time of menopause is different from woman to woman, most begin between the ages of 45-55.

Postmenopause:

Postmenopause is the stage of life after your final menstrual period. Sometimes the terms menopause and post menopause are used interchangeably.

It's important to talk to your doctor or other health care professional about the effect these changes may have on your body and your health.

Remember all women are different. I started perimenopause at 35 and it didn't finish until I was 54. It can cause hair decrease in some areas and hair increase on the face. It can cause you to gain weight, depression, serious mood swings especially when you are having hot flashes.

There are remedies that can help. Talk to your doctor. There are some natural products that can help.

The biggest help is understanding and help from your family and friends. They need to remember you cannot help these symptoms.

DID YOU KNOW THIS ABOUT ADOLF HITLER?

Eighteen year old Adolf had grand ideas of someday becoming a great artist. Each October, entrance examinations were held at the Academy of fine arts in Vienna. Despite his misgivings about leaving his mother, Hitler's artistic ambitions had driven him to withdraw his inheritance from the bank and move to Vienna to study at the academy.

Problems had arisen for Hitler when he failed the academy's entrance exam and his mother's condition took a turn for the worse. He left Vienna, feeling quite depressed and went back home to his mother and did not tell her he failed the exam.

Hitler's mother bore the pain well, but Adolf anguished over every moment of her suffering. On December 21st amid the glowing lights of the family's Christmas tree she died.

Klara Hitler was buried on a misty foggy December day in the cemetery of Leonding, next to her husband.

The next day, Christmas Eve, Hitler and his sisters paid a visit to Dr. Bloch and settled the medical bill. The doctor gave the family a break on the charges . Adolf expressed profound gratitude to the doctor and said he would be forever grateful.

Now with both parents gone, Hitler once again set his sights on Vienna and the art academy. He moved there in February 1908. But in that beautiful old city things would go quite poorly for Hitler. He would eventually wind up sleeping on park benches and eating at charity soup kitchens. His years of misery in Vienna would also be a time when he formulated many of his ideas on politics and race which would have immense consequences in the future.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE HOLOCAUST

On April,1, 1933, the Nazis investigated their first action against German Jews by announcing a boycott of all Jewish-run businesses.

The Nuremberg Laws, issued on September 15, 1935, began to exclude Jews from public life. The Nuremberg Laws included a law that stripped German Jews of their citizenship and a law that prohibited marriages and extramarital sex between Jews and Germans. The Nuremberg Laws set the legal precedent for further anti-Jewish legislation.

Nazis then issued additional Anti-Jews laws over the next several years. For example some of these laws excluded Jews from the places like parks, fired them from civil seror government jobs and made Jews register their property, and prevented Jewish doctors from working on anyone other than Jewish patients.

During the night of November 9-10, 1938, Nazis incited a program against Jews in Austria and Germany in what has been termed, (Night of Broken Glass). This night of violence included the pillaging and burning of synagogues, breaking the windows of Jewish-owned business, the looting of these stores, and many Jews were physically attacked.

Also approximately 30,000 Jews were arrested and sent to concentration camps.

After World War 11 started in 1939 the Nazis began ordering Jews to wear a yellow star of David on their clothing so that Jews could be easily recognized and targeted.
