THE SIXTH ANNUAL WINSLOW RUN HALF MARATHON AND 5k will be held Saturday, September 10th from 8 a.m. until noon.

Proceeds from this race support local organizations that benefit Winslow and the surrounding area. Please help us make it a success.

Half Marathon runners will start at the former Winslow school on US 71 at 8:00 a.m. and will immediately turn left onto School Street. The 5k will start 15 minutes later and will follow the same course.

From Main Street, the runners will turn right onto Van Buren. Within 45 minutes, Van Buren to Center Street should be clear of most runners.

Runners will continue along Van Buren to Bunyard Road. There will be runners on this part of Van Buren and Bunyard Road from just after 8 a.m. until close to noon. There will be runners on Center Street from about 8:30 a.m. until noon.

By participating, the runners are contributing financially to our community. To thank them and to keep our community and the runners safe, the Winslow Community Development Council is asking residents to:

- Please avoid driving on the course between 8 AM. and noon on Saturday the 10th.
- If you have dogs, please keep them restrained during the race.
- If the runners are passing your house, come out and cheer them on!

WHAT'S GOING ON IN WINSLOW?

The City of Winslow will be very busy for the next week or so resurfacing some of the streets in town due to a \$250,000 grant from the State Street Aid Program. This will involve preparing the streets and covering them with an inch and a half overlay of asphalt.

The following streets will be covered by the grant, Main, School, Van Buren west of Main, and Peek Ave. The City will also be working on Wexel, Two Gun Rd, Sunset inside the Winslow City Limits, Belle Starr and part of Rickman. If the weather will cooperate this project should be done by the end of next week.

A big Thank you goes out to Ken Stout for his help in securing a Beaver Lake Watershed Grant to make Winslow a Tree City USA. This grant required meeting 4 requirements, a City Proclamation, a City Ordinance, Planting Trees, and Volunteer Hours. The volunteer hours were more than met with the hours from the Master Gardener's and the volunteers for recycling and other activities in Winslow. This grant will cover the cost of planting trees in Winslow, eradicating Kudzu that is trying to take over, and removing dead trees in the Ballpark and Peek's Park.

A joint project between the City and the Win-Fest committee at the Ballpark will be near completion in the next couple weeks. The stage, dugout, & Concession Stand are being painted and spiffed up. Behind the stage Jeff Jackson and Chris Masa built steps from the access road to the stage down to the level behind the stage and Jerry Sample is building the handrails for it. A huge "Thank You, Guys", I, for one really appreciate it.

In the next few weeks of September and October Winslow will be having lots of visitors. Winslow's EHC Wins **Grand Championship** Ribbon

Winslow Extension Homemakers Club won First Place and the Grand Championship Ribbon at the Washington County Fair for their display "The Beneficial Bat". The display showed places where you will find bats living by pushing a button and lighting up the various homes of bats, a few being, caves, under the eaves of houses, under bridges, hollow trees, under the bark of the Shag bark Hickory tree, and in bat houses and yes, you might even find a few in the belfry.

Many bats are on the endangered species lists. Many have been lost to White-Nose Syndrome. At present White-Nose Syndrome has not been found to affect humans.

Contrary to "old wives tales", bats are not hazardous to your health nor are the carriers of rabies. They can contract rabies just as any mammal can but are rarely aggressive as are the four legged mammals. In fact they are not an aggressive animal at all. They are also an exceptionally clean animal.

A colony of 30 bats will consume thousands of mosquitoes, gnats and other flying insects in one night. With West Nile Virus and the Zika Virus found in Arkansas recently this is a good time to have some colonies in your

There are many interesting facts about bats and benefits they provide around your homestead.

Devil's Den State Park has a Bat 'O Rama every year explaining the kinds of bats found in this area, their habits, and the advantages of having them around. This display is being donated to Devil's Den for teaching purposes and will be available for the public to see. They will also have the flyer that was with the display on building a bat house. Fall and winter are the best time to put up Bat Houses.
