The seventh annual Winslow Run Half Marathon and 5K will be held Saturday, September 16th from 8 a.m. until noon.

Half Marathon runners will start at the former Winslow school on US 71 at 8:00 a.m. and will immediately turn left onto School Street. The 5K will start 15 minutes later and will follow the same course.

From Main Street, the runners will turn right onto Van Buren. Within 45 minutes, Van Buren to Center Street should be clear of most runners.

Runners will continue along Van Buren to Bunyard Road. There will be runners on this part of Van Buren and Bunyard Road from just after 8 a.m. until close to noon. There will be runners on Center Street from about 8:30 a.m. until noon.

An Essay About The Formation Of The Winslow Community Center Association, Its Goals, Purposes, And Successes.

PART 2

We filed for incorporation papers with the state of Arkansas and paid our filing fee (\$50.00). Gary Simpson Worked with the University of Arkansas Law Clinic to get our legal papers written. We worked on our bylaws, and after various changes and amendments, we approved them. We applied for 501C3 status with the IRS. We needed to have two public meetings, so we put up flyers advertising the first one to be at the WHS Rock School building the ninth of December, 2014. It was well attended with over forty persons in attendance. We discussed our aims, purposes and plans. We had a lot of input from those which attended the meeting.

We scheduled a second meeting at the Brentwood Community Center for January 13th, 2015. It was well attended also, and much discussion and ideas were shared. There were over fifty persons signed the attendance sheet, and there were some that didn't. We felt that both meetings were a success and we received much input from the community. We received our incorporation papers on January 2, 2015 as an incorporated entity. We are making progress on becoming capable of receiving the School property and we will diligently seek to get it.

Gary Simpson, (our President) said at our March 20th meeting, that he had attended the Greenland School board meeting (March 19) and that they had voted unanimously to begin proceedings to donate the property to the WCCA. This was very good news. We continued to meet together and refine our bylaws, organize fundraisers, plan projects, and implement different ideas and suggestions into these plans and goals. Gary Simpson met with the Arkansas Law Clinic and received needed help with our legal needs. On March the 18, 2015, we received our 501C3 status papers from the IRS making us eligible to receive the former Winslow School property. We have made advances and are marching toward our goal. I will have more to come next month.

W-D 40

WD-40 was created in 1953 by three technicians at the San Diego Rocket Chemical Company. Its name comes from the project that was to find a 'water displacement' compound. They were successful with the 40th formulation, thus WD-40. The Convair Company bought it in bulk to protect their atlas missile parts. Ken East (one of the original founders) says there is nothing in WD-40 that would hurt you...

- 4. Gives floors that 'just-waxed' sheen without making them slippery

- 7. Removes lipstick stains
- 8. Loosens stubborn zippers
- 9. Untangles jewelry chains
- 10. Removes stains from stainless steel sinks
- 11. Removes dirt and grime from the barbecue grill
- 12. Keeps ceramic/terra-cotta garden pots from oxidizing
- 13. Removes tomato stains from clothing
- 14. Keeps glass (and plastic) shower doors free of water spots
- 15. Camouflages scratches in ceramic and marble floors

- 18. It removes black scuff marks from the kitchen floor! Use WD-40 for those nasty tar and scuff marks on flooring. It doesn't seem to harm the finish and you won't have to scrub nearly as hard to get them off. Just remember to open some windows if you have a lot of marks
- 19. Bug guts will eat away the finish on your car if not removed quickly! Use WD-40!
- 20. Gives a children's playground slide a shine for a super fast slide
- 21. Lubricates gear shift and mower deck lever for ease of handling on riding mowers
- 22. Rids kid's rocking chairs and swings of squeaky noises
- 23. Lubricates tracks in sticking home windows and makes them easier to open

Number 5, how many times a day do you think about the perversions being forced on you and your children and how repulsive are they to you?


Number 6, what do you think about the fact the innocence of your children no longer exist?

WHERE IS THE LAMB?

For three days they had been traveling. At last Abraham and Isaac halted at the place of sacrifice. But Isaac realized something was very wrong. The wood and the fire – the external trappings of their religion – were present. But Isaac saw that the essential ingredient – the lamb – was missing! "Where is the lamb," was his puzzled question. Abraham calmly replied: "God will provide for Himself a lamb." (Genesis 22.7-8.)

The substitute lamb God provided to take Isaac's place was a powerful symbol of the lamb God would later provide as a substitute for all of humanity — the One of whom it was said: "Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world." (John 1.29.) Jesus is truly the essential ingredient in our religion!

Often today, we can't help wondering, "Where is the Lamb?"

- (1) Where Is The Lamb In Much Of Modern Religion? We have witnessed the rise of a Christ-less "Christianity"! Many churches are more interested in politics than in a crucified Savior. Philosophy, Psychology, and Sociology declaim from pulpits where the Lamb is excluded. While clinging to the external trappings, many churches have jettisoned the essential ingredient! (Colossians 2.8.)
- (2) Where Is The Lamb In Modern Life? Christ has been exiled from court house and school room. He is excluded from the conference rooms of big business and ignored in the halls of government. His name is rarely mentioned in casual conversation except as blasphemy. He is banished from the ball park and the movie theater. He must be content with an occasional mention on the religious page of the newspaper. (Colossians 1.27.)
- (3) Where Is The Lamb In The Lives Of His Followers? The most shocking void of all is the absence of the Lamb from the lives of many who claim to be His disciples. How tragic that the lives of far too many Christians do not really reflect the image of Christ! The world cannot see the Lamb in us if He is not there! (Colossians 3.1.)

A world entangled in a moral wilderness cries: "Where is the Lamb?" May we find the courage to direct them confidently to "the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world."
