Let's all try to help these poor homeless animals who are just looking for a home and someone to love and be loved.




**“GARDENERS SEED & PLANT SWAP”



"The Cavern"

Societies throughout the world at one time or another have either dissipated or scattered. The Indian Nation did exactly that from the 1500's to the 1700's. In the cavern, there is evidence of different tribes congregating amongst each other. Each tribe may have spoken a different language but the idea of the way things were to be in their world was apparently the same.

Indians believed close to the way Christians believe today before the teachings of missionaries: An "upper" existence that housed certain spiritual elements, a "middle" that housed all Indians, and a "lower" that engulfed evilness. Snakes were creatures both in the "lower" but part of the "lower-middle". Plants and animals were once considered divine entities, but as man's greed flourished, they became nothing more than food for thought, although Indians honored that which they killed, such as the animals of the forest.

Though some men have interpreted their beliefs as purely mythical, the Cherokee presented the idea that some existence of power, more so than any being on earth, created originally one man and one woman to populate the world. They believed in a "Divine Entity" and a world of darkness. Never meeting Galileo, they believed the world was indeed round. The Cherokee was at home in North Carolina and honored the "mountains of smoke"

Many legends and myths were held in high regard amongst tribes. Yet, many so called myths coincided with the Christian beliefs of today. They believed in a great deluge – a flood- that destroyed the bad people of existence and the earth – itself. It was noted that it was necessary for purification. The good amongst the bad survived and repopulated the earth.

Everything is connected, trees, rocks, the land, water, the sky, the stars in the heavens, and man. Everything was a balance, though good and bad both existed. Harmony relied on the balance of food on earth and the good in the "Spiritual Existence". The "bad" was necessary to realize the "Good". The "god"-Father of all creation was not himself created, but away was.

The Osage were related to the Sioux and believed everything had a spirit. By that thought everything was connected together in harmony. The taking of animals was always followed by a prayer, thanking the animal for its kindness in feeding and clothing purposes. Just for the , tribes did not believe the Eagle was the Great Spirit in the upper atmosphere. The eagle was an intermediary, a go-between for the Great Spirit. Of course for all "plains" Indians, nothing was closer to the Great Spirit as the buffalo.

Missionaries came about and spoke the delusion that Indians were paganistic because of their myths and legends. Yet, the white man had his myths and legends and with all his intelligence,, never had the patience to realize that Indians revered everything that surround him. Prior to eating animals, he prayed. At the birth of his children, he prayed. As he planted, he prayed. For the plants that cured his illnesses, he prayed. Prior to any great hunt, he prayed. Many Indians believed that though the body decayed at death, the Spirit lived on, and that "spirit" had a soul.

In all respects the "People: were indeed sacred. They disagreed with our thoughts in many aspects, but part of the reasoning was the idea that they did indeed respect everything associated with survival. Even death was not to be feared. It completed the round circle of life itself. Death was not thought of as we, today, many of us think of it. It was not the "end result", merely a changed existence.

This article I have written is what I so gathered by, some of the artistry of the Indian Nation, not being by any means an expert concerning such matters I can only assume that what I have interpreted is actually truth

Luke 11: 1 And it came to pass, that, as he was praying in a certain place, when he ceased, one of his disciples said unto him, Lord, teach us to pray, as John also taught his disciples.

Luke 11: 2 And he said unto them, When ye pray, say, Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name. Thy Kingdom Come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven

One Sunday morning at a small southern church, the new pastor called on one of his older deacons to lead in the opening prayer. The deacon stood up, bowed his head and said,"Lord, I hate buttermilk."
