Past, Present, & Future: Halloween

It's October and that means it's a month of eating too much candy, dressing up in fun costumes, and if you're lucky, getting the scare of a lifetime! Not to mention, if you're like me and happy to have summer done and gone, October will bring about cooler weather, more vibrant colors in the trees, and the chance to break out some of those winter clothes I love to wear!

The origin of Halloween dates back to the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain (pronounced sow-in), which was held the night before their New Year (November 1st). The Celts, who lived 2000 years ago in present day Ireland, northern France, and the UK, believed that on the night of Samhain, the line between the living and dead became blurred and that the ghosts of the dead returned to earth to roam. During their Samhain celebrations, the Celtic priests built huge sacred bonfires to offer sacrifices to their deities, and the Celts dressed up in costumes, usually consisting of animal heads and their skins, and attempted to tell each other's fortunes.

In the seventh century, Pope Boniface IV designated November 1st to be All Saints' Day, to honor Christian saints and martyrs. It's believed that the Pope was actually trying to replace the pagan Celtic festival of Samhain with a more church sanctioned holiday. This celebration was called All-hallows or All-Hallowmas and the night before it, Samhain, was called All-hallows Eve and eventually Halloween. "Trick or treating" probably dates back to the early All Souls' Day parades in England, where poor citizens would beg for food and families would give them pastries called "soul cakes" in return for their promise to pray for the family's dead relatives.

In the latter half of the 19th century, America was flooded with millions of Irish immigrants, fleeing the potato famine of 1846, and this helped nationalize the celebration of Halloween in America, because they brought along their traditions of dressing up in costumes and would go from door to door asking for food or money. By the 1920's, Halloween had evolved into town-wide parties and parades, and the practice of "trick or treating" was seen as a relatively inexpensive way for the entire community to share in the celebration. It was also thought that people could prevent tricks being played on them by offering a small treat to the community's youth.

At present, Halloween is celebrated in the more recent traditional sense of kids dressing up in costume and trick or treating, adults have parties or go to "haunted houses"; all of this and more are what have made Halloween the sec-

ond largest commercial holiday for Americans, who spend an estimated \$6.9 Billion annually on Halloween. The Samhain symbol of Pomona is the apple; which is likely what lead to the tradition of bobbing for apples, which is still practiced today. Many major cities have a variety of "haunted" attractions that typically run the entire month of October; Nightmares Haunted House in Bentonville (<http://www.hauntednightmares.com/>), Screams from the Cellar located in Hot Springs (<http://www.arkansasx.com/>), and the 2010 CAT Spooktacular in Fayetteville (<http://www.catfayetteville.org/>) are a few of the area's Halloween attractions for this year.

I for one enjoy Halloween for the fear factor involved. I've been to a lot of the Halloween attractions in the Tulsa area and I'm looking forward to checking out what Arkansas has to offer. I wasn't able to find that many, but I'm hoping, as the holiday approaches, more and more advertisements for a good scare will start popping up. The future of Halloween will likely continue to grow as a commercialized holiday and more and more money is likely to be spent on the holiday. I wouldn't be surprised if Halloween one day ties with Christmas for the most commercialized holiday among Americans.


