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NEWS FROM THE WINSLOW MUSEUM

The Winslow Museum applied to the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program (AHPP) to have St. Stephen's Episcopal Cemetery put on the National Register of Historic Places. Although the criteria are difficult to meet, we still remain hopeful that the cemetery will be recognized as meeting the requirements. We received word that the cemetery is eligible to be placed on the State of Arkansas Register of Historic Places. We were asked to compile more information on how persons buried in the cemetery are tied to Winslow and its rich history. After submitting this additional information we received a letter from the AHPP stating that because of the historical significant, the representatives will be making a trip to Winslow sometime in April to visit the cemetery, as well as, other historic sites which may be eligible to the state or national register. We are very excited about the possibilities for our little town.

The Winslow Museum is still seeking donations of pictures, post cards, stories, and artifacts from the cabin courts, restaurants, and other attractions located on Highway 71. These items can be given to the museum or put on loan to be returned to the owner. These will be included in a special display. Of course, we are always seeking donations of money or artifacts of any nature pertaining to Winslow's history.

Membership for the Winslow Museum is \$1.00 a year and forms can be picked up at Winslow City Hall or the Winslow Museum. The museum board and officers meet the last Thursday of every month at 5 PM in City Hall. Anyone interested in attended are always welcome. We value your input. Looking for Winslow History Dates and Happenings

I have been working on a Time line for Winslow for the Washington County Historical Society. Much of the history of the area has been documented in Robert Winn's books and several other books about the area. However I'd like to go a step further and add a Time line to be used in the Winslow Museum that documents when each of the founding families moved here and where they settled. I have done some work in the Washington County Archives and at the Fayetteville Library. There are still a couple of resources I want to check out as time allows.

Some things just are not documented in the records that are available. Apparently some of Winslow's records may have been destroyed in the fire of the East side in the early 1930's.

Does anyone remember when Hwy 74 was rerouted to its present location? In a picture that was taken about 1945 it shows a foot bridge across a deep ditch west of the Depot. Was that ditch filled in when the Hwy was changed and was a culvert put in then?

Information on progress from about 1940 to the present is very sketchy. If you have the information and are interested in talking to me about it, I'd love to visit with you. If you have pictures that would be even better.

My priority is the information on the City, but I will talk with you on either the City or your family.

Some of you provided your family stories for our book "Winslow - Past and Present" in 2005 for our centennial. I do have that for a reference, but there were some who either didn't have the information at that time or didn't get it to the committee. Those are the families I am looking for. News from Winslow Community Center Association

The cogs of bureaucracy forever turn slowly. The process for this project will be no different. It's hard for us to remain patient; it's hard for us to ask you to remain patient. But that's our first request. We can report, some progress has been made. After learning the cost of reopening Winslow Elementary School (\$2.5M to \$3M), the Greenland School Board has voted to "divest of the property" formerly known as the Winslow School. As with everything, that isn't so cut and dry. Things like "...divest of the property" will have to be defined. And, there are requirements, with both the School District and the State, which have to be met. Greenland Schools desires returning this property to the community but they must meet all the requirements from state guidelines. But Greenland Schools making this decision is a major step. And the WCCA is taking the necessary steps to be in position to receive the property when it finally becomes available to us.

The U of A Legal department has provided a law student with a special understanding of non-profit organizations. He is guiding us through the legal bureaucracy to make certain that all business dealings with the WCCA are above board, meet all requirements, and are a benefit to the community center project now, and in the future.

Additionally, the WCCA has made a concerted outreach using social media. But for our community's cause to go viral, and really get the important exposure and financial support we need, we ask you to please continue sharing our Facebook page with your friends. Invite them to like the page and show their support for our cause.

Money obstacles are going to be one of the biggest hurdles facing the Community Center project. On Day 1 we will need a minimum of \$5,000 to cover the costs to Salrin, or Charles Dwyer. Additionally, we have created an online-donation site at <http://www.gofundme.com/wccafundraiser> which allows you to gift anonymously using a number of payment options. Note: This online method is considered a "gift" not a tax-deductible donation. It's an excellent way to donate small amounts to the acquisition, restoration and re-purposing of our School.

In addition, the WCCA is hosting a Gospel Concert at the 1st Baptist Church in Winslow featuring Gospel Acts The Gospel Sonlighters, The Glen Faulkner Group and also featuring Larry Garrison on Friday, April 10th at 6:30 PM. Donations will be accepted.

Mark your calendars for Saturday, May 16th - when the WCCA hosts a blues/rock afternoon at the Winfest Stage with phenomenal local bands and appearance times to be announced. This is one fundraiser everyone will attend!

And as a tribute to the roots of these hills, a Bluegrass Concert late spring or early summer with Bluegrass bands that will be announced as soon as everything is set. All proceeds will go to the WCCA. So again, patience is the most important thing that we can ask of you. Your continued support of our fundraising efforts and keeping up with the information disseminated through our Facebook is a great asset for the WCCA's efforts towards acquiring, renovating and repurposing the former Winslow Schools.

I've been very busy working on new books. While I'm writing the third in The Victorians Series, Tyra's Gambler, we're getting ready to release the second in A Twist of Poe mysteries, The Tell-Tale Stone, set in fictional Grace County, Arkansas, due out on May 5 from Oghma Creative Media. I think readers will continue to like Tyra as they did when she made brief appearances in the first two books. The Victorians is published by The Wild Rose Press.

We're tentatively thinking about edits and a cover for the book due out in October for Halloween. It's A Savage Grace, a horror novel set in Arkansas, about a woman possessed by a demon who can only free himself from a deep, dark dungeon by tricking her into taking out a few folks who annoy her. You'll never see the end of this one coming.

Beyond the Moon, also set in Arkansas, and published by Oghma Creative Media, is now available in hard cover as well as paperback and Ebook. If you haven't read this one you're missing a love story you'll never forget.

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

What Was The First Liquid And Food Consumed On The Moon?

(This came from an email I received. I thought it very interesting and appropriate for this season. JK)

I'm betting that most are unaware of this story.

Forty-five years ago, two human beings changed history by walking on the surface of the moon. But, what happened before Buzz Aldrin and Neil Armstrong exited the Lunar Module is perhaps even more amazing, if only because so few people know about it. I'm talking about the fact that Buzz Aldrin took communion on the surface of the moon. Some months after his return, he wrote about it in Guideposts magazine.

The background to the story is that Aldrin was an elder at his Presbyterian Church in Texas during this period in his life; and, knowing that he would soon be doing something unprecedented in human history, he felt that he should mark the occasion somehow. He asked his minister to help him. And so the minister consecrated a communion wafer and a small vial of communion wine. Buzz Aldrin took them with him out of the Earth's orbit and onto the surface of the moon. He and Armstrong had only been on the lunar surface for a few minutes when Aldrin made the following public statement:

"This is the LM pilot. I'd like to take this opportunity to ask every person listening in, whoever and wherever they may be, to pause for a moment and contemplate the events of the past few hours and to give thanks in his or her own way."□ He then ended radio communication, and there, on the silent surface of the moon, 250,000 miles from home, he read a verse from the Gospel of John, and he took communion.

Here is his own account of what happened: "In the radio blackout, I opened the little plastic packages which contained the bread and the wine. I poured the wine into the chalice our church had given me. In the one-sixth gravity of the moon, the wine slowly curled and gracefully came up the side of the cup. Then I read the scripture"□

'I am the vine, you are the branches.

Whosoever abides in me will bring forth much fruit ...

Apart from me you can do nothing.'

"I had intended to read my communion passage back to Earth, but at the last minute [they] had requested that I not do this. NASA was already embroiled in a legal battle with Madelyn Murray O'Hare, the celebrated opponent of religion, over the Apollo 8 crew's reading from Genesis while orbiting the moon at Christmas. I agreed reluctantly."

"I ate the tiny Host and swallowed the wine. I gave thanks for the intelligence and spirit that had brought two young pilots to the Sea of Tranquility. It was interesting for me to think that the very first

liquid ever poured on the moon and the very first food eaten there were the communion elements."

"And, of course, it's interesting to think that some of the first words spoken on the moon were the words of Jesus Christ, who made the Earth and the moon - and who, in the immortal words of Dante, is Himself the "Love that moves the Sun and other stars."

How many of you knew this? Too bad this type of news doesn't travel as fast as the bad does.

Jesus said, "If you are ashamed of me, I will be ashamed of you before My Father on Judgment Day."

Interesting Times

(This is another email I received that reflects what several Pastors have been talking about in their sermons. JK)

Thought you'd like this. We've had 252 earthquakes in Arkansas this past year. They are small, M1.5 or greater, but the bricks on our house have been damaged and the concrete floor in an area that is more than 60 years old with no movement has sagged and opened a crack half an inch wide. One of the worst earthquakes in US history, happened in the New Madrid fault in eastern Arkansas. It was a 7.7 which sent the Mississippi river running backwards, made islands disappear and filled the river with debris in 1811.

Oklahoma had three times as many earthquakes as California in 2014. From 1978 to 2008, Oklahoma averaged less than 2 M3.0 earthquakes per year. Since 2008 Oklahoma has had 2547 M1.5 or greater quakes. In 2014 alone, Oklahoma had 562 M3.0 or higher quakes which can be damaging.

Arkansas also has experienced many times more quakes in the past five years than previously. Fracking is believed to be the culprit

The Bible predicts that there will be in the last days, "earthquakes and famines." Many things are following up the Biblical prophecy scenario. The world is in turmoil politically and economically. Nature is following the Biblical path also. We are living in interesting times.
