To begin, the WCCA wants to thank the Washington County Sheriff's Office for the increased presence at and around the property. That, in addition to new locks and cameras, has decreased the vandalism and thievery in a noticeable manner. We thank so many in the community that responded to our calls for help in identifying and stopping some of the mischief makers. There will be no Winslow Community Center without the Community and the outpouring of support was gratifying.

Now for the latest updates on where we stand. Everything is moving along. The WCCA presented the Greenland School district with a letter of intent outlining our needs and visions for the Winslow Community Center. The school district accepted our letter and has turned it over to the Attorney General's office for a decision on donating all of the former school property to the Winslow Community Center Association. The Attorney General's office should return that decision within 90 days.

Additionally, we have taken possession of parts of the old school building that is not being utilized by the library, Friends of the Library or the City of Winslow. We will be establishing a permanent office along with class and meeting rooms to be used to meet some of our future goals.

Funding is still an issue and will continue to be for the foreseeable future. Future fundraising ideas have been discussed and any suggestions you have for fundraising will be welcome.

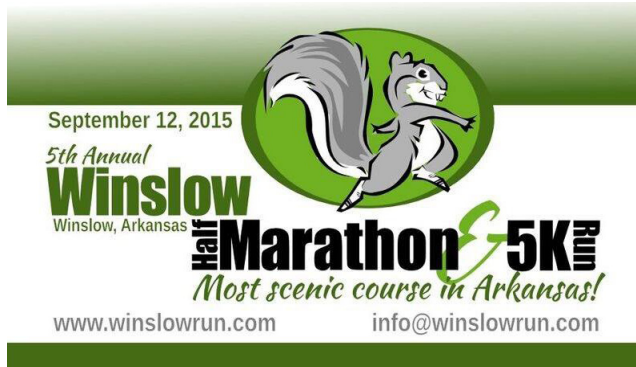

The Cavern

Chapter 16

The Cavern is somewhat a mystical existence, yet also a creative work of art. It represents an idea of culture of different peoples and their way of life. It teaches us that it's ok to be different, it's ok to re-create the world the way we see fit to do so. Every artist does just that and all of us see something different. History within is a moving spirit of all negative and positive aspects of life on earth – past, present, and future. The history may always be controversial yet to some – convincing.

There is a moving spirit that lays from within the very walls of this marvel, possibly, the spirit of life for different groups of peoples that decided to share vast information to a future existence. Maybe, it was their way of our present day idea of “time-share.”

Each hieroglyphic represents a perception and some excitement of any given moment of any situation – a realistic endeavor of history.

Imagination also exists in faded murals. I, myself, do not fully understand the exact meaning of some ‘artistic flair’, but as an artist I can appreciate the works, none-the-less.

Today, because of changes, we may share some of the same feelings of past peoples in their struggles to survive. In anytime zone, there is always the struggle of uncertainty. Social change will happen only if we allow it to do so.

To adapt to changes and then make those changes work for us in productivity and prosperity is the challenge of any interval in time. The Indian nation had tremendous challenges to endure and too often refused any changes to their existence. Their initial way of life was sacred to them, yet in many respects their insight was poor. Changes were inevitable: time and progress marched forward. At times the Indian was stuck in his own dimension, but he was outgunned in many ways. Victorious he was – only in spurts of excitement. Many scenes seem to predict the final outcome – their final demise.

The cavern may indeed serve as a reminder of past glorification, and also what could happen if all of us are not careful. If we destroy that which surrounds us, it may be then we – ourselves become the next endangered species of existence. Great satisfaction of any enduring existence comes not from monetary value, but from the insight we all possess, yet often seldom use. All of us, each of us, have an illusion of individuality to recreate the world in our own special way, to recreate our surroundings. Insight and wisdom is what allows us to endure changes that are inevitable.

There are four exits in the cavern that the group never explored. Over 50 years ago, two “thin” kids explored a cave that runs parallel with the cavern, some 75-100 yards away. The cave they ventured into came out where both the hummingbirds and bears are plentiful. Now, just for the record, the cavern is not in Devil's Den. It is on the Eastern side of Hwy 71 South.

When I stated “not to follow me because we all might get lost”, you have to realize that it's been awhile since I have been in the cavern. Also, having ill health, at times I'm on some powerful

drugs. Tromping around in the woods or forest can prove to be confusing while on these drugs.

There are several caves underneath Hwy 71 S. One goes under a café in Winslow Township. These do not go to the cavern, not as far as I know. It is possible that the cave the two Winslow kids had traveled somewhere inside, empties into the cavern, for there are also corridors in that cave, the two kids did not take. This cave they traveled is approximately eight to eight and a half miles long. The cave is dark and narrow. Once in and on your stomach much of the time, there's no way to stand up or turn around at long intervals. It is pitch-black inside. Squeezing thru narrow walls of rock is normal for this cave. On the kid's route of travel, there is nothing of interest from point (A) to point (B).

The “motherlode” is not in Mena, Arkansas. That should be obvious as the Spaniards were highly disappointed with the little quantity of gold they found. Gold, like oil, replenishes itself, and gold travels with the waterline and goes downhill. In spite of some folks thinking, the White River does not go uphill. Water travels the least resistance. Years ago \$13-15 million dollars of gold was excavated from a creek in West Fork by the University of Arkansas. It was not Lee Creek, as far as I know. Good luck on finding that out on the Internet! A creek many people once fished and very snaky. How do you suppose they knew that gold was there? It was underwater, not very deep, but underwater. The time period was back in the 1980's...

There were three Trails of Tears, not merely one. The main one we all know or recognize, does not pass by the cavern. One trail with but a handful of starving Indians actually did go through the Boston Mountains and passed close by the cavern. That trail was taken for a reason other than moving Indians to Oklahoma. There were only about 1200 or so Indians that traveled that trail, unlike the Trail of Tears we all understand. That trail could have been an old wagon road used to haul goods in and out of the valley at a later date. Also trees were cut down and hauled out of the valley for the building of the railroad line during the construction of track and tunnel. Some of that trail is now privately owned and a GPS would definitely come in handy.

On the Eastern side of an entrance to the cavern is a creek bed where water trickles down to what once stood an embodiment of water. On the northern side, a slough appeared catching run-off water, by floods. On the western side, no creeks appear. On the southern side, a few miles down the way appears a fairly new development of water and surroundings.

The Winslow "Silent People" Project Ongoing

The Story of the Silent People: Finnish artist Reijo Kela unveiled his "Silent People" for the first time in his 1988 presentation 'Ilmari's Ploughed Field' in Lassila's Field. They reappeared later in Helsinki's Senaatintori Market Place as part of the 1994 Kainuu Exhibition.

Twelve hundred Silent People had made the journey down to Helsinki but there was room for only 700 of them on the steps in front of the Cathedral. The presentation was erected during the night and over the proceeding two days created quite a stir in the Capital. The following night the display was dismantled and sent back home to Suomussalmi. The Silent People moved to their present home in the autumn of 1994.

People often ask what precisely is the idea behind the Silent People. A state of psychological withdrawal? The mute Kainuu soul? A forgotten people? Reijo Kela refuses to provide any answer. Viewers are free to come to their own conclusions.

Matthew 6: 9 quotes him as saying "After this manner therefore pray ye".

Neither of these Disciples quotes Jesus as saying "This is how I pray". Instead they quote him as saying "This how you pray". This begs the question; how did this get to be called "The Lord's Prayer". Jesus didn't say "This is How I Pray, he said "this is How You Pray. This is your Prayer.

I'm going to break it down in the next few months and see if we can understand just how powerful this prayer really is.

Our Father which art in heaven; no explanation needed. However, the next phrase "Hallowed be thy name" words can hardly describe what that really means but even in our lowly carnal minds and definitions, it is truly amazing. What you mean when you say this phrase is; you are beautiful, you are glorious, you are wonderful, you are holy, I honor you. You are most sacred, you have my heartfelt respect, reverence and worship. Everything that pertains to the worship of the father is contained in this phrase "Hallowed be thy name".

As the man turned to leave, he said, 'You know, if that new preacher hadn't told me that I was one of God's children, I probably never would have amounted to anything!' And he walked away.

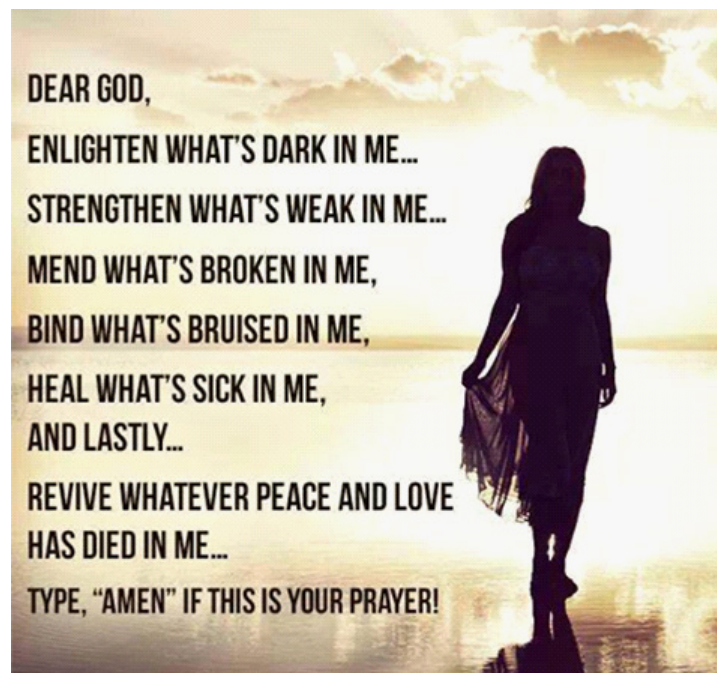
The seminary professor and his wife were stunned. He called the waitress over & asked her, 'Do you know who that man was -- the one who just left that was sitting at our table?'
