The tour is open to anyone. It will focus on the trees native to our area. Native trees and plants are the most beneficial to our ecosystem. Plans are still being worked out but the initial idea is to hike through the wooded areas of the ball park, especially the approximately quarter-mile trail that runs by many kinds of trees in the park on the far eastern hill of the park, above the east side of Two Gun Road.

Jennifer graduated from the University of Arkansas with an M.S. in Biology, and worked as Col-

The Return of the Squirrels

An essay about the formation of the Winslow Community Center Association, it's goals, purposes and successes.

In March of 2014 I had a meeting with Gary Simpson at his request. He came to my home and we met in the kitchen and talked over coffee. He outlined a plan to form an association of local people for the purpose of recovering the Winslow School property that we had lost to the Greenland School district through consolidation in 2004. He said that he had been meeting with some others and would like for me to meet them and join their group. He said that he was from Cotter Arkansas, and that they were able to keep their school property after consolidation. I was impressed by his knowledge and enthusiasm and vision; never the less, I expressed my skepticism that we could attain the return of the property. Gary said he would call me when he could arrange a meeting. After his call I met with the others in his group and we agreed to go forward with this, and have a formal meeting April 20, at the Rock School building. We had a structured meeting with a financial report, voted to open another bank account, and discussed the Greenland School Board meeting where they discussed the donation of the school property back to Winslow. We authorized President Gary Simpson to seek pro-bono legal advice to assure that the WCCA met all legal requirements to receive the school campus; to engage in negotiations to purchase, or long term lease agreement negotiation for possession of the Winslow School campus for the community of Winslow Arkansas.

We continued to meet throughout the spring and summer of 2014, dealing with many different needs, problems, applying for different legal requirement, filed papers with the State of Arkansas, applied for Non-Profit status in a time that the I R S was delaying most applications for long months, and in some cases years. I will have more information to come next month.

“KUDZU WAR” IN TUNNEL PARK CONTINUES

The war on Kudzu continued last week with landscape contractor Isaac Ogle donating his service to target-spray the remaining kudzu vines on the cleared patch of hill above Tunnel Park.

Left without eradication, kudzu vines grow very quickly, covering and killing all the trees in their way. The Tunnel Park project started with an arborist removing a swath of about a dozen dead trees there last August.

On June 24, ten volunteers from northwest Arkansas—including three from Winslow—prepared the hill for Isaac’s work--by trimming away plants near the 80 plus seedlings which a previous volunteer effort had planted on March 18. They also ventured further into the woods to dig and remove more kudzu crowns and roots.

The event partners and sponsors for both those workdays were Patagonia, Pack Rat Outdoor Center, and Beaver Water District. Beaver Watershed Alliance (BWA) organized both events, with coordination by Sarah Hallett of BWA and Ken Stout of the Winslow Community Development Council.

Sometime this fall, the Kudzu War in Tunnel Park will continue with another volunteer day or two to dig and eradicate the remaining kudzu further up (southwest) Main Street, adjacent to the cleared half-acre.

So, stay tuned...and come join us in the next battle! If you are having a kudzu invasion on your land or nearby, come learn how to deal with it.

STREAM RESTORATION PROJECT DOWNTOWN WINSLOW

Folks driving by Peek’s Park in downtown Winslow this summer have no doubt wondered about the piles of huge rocks and mounds of soil stacked under the cottonwoods.

Through a Beaver Watershed Alliance (BWA) grant, the Watershed Conservation Resource Center (WCRC) started on July 17th to do a major stream bank restoration project on what some call “Squirrel Branch”, the stream that flows along the west side of Peek’s Park, on the edge of South Winslow Blvd. (Hwy. 74).

The WCRC’s “Restoration Plan” is 14 pages of plans, budget, site photos, and diagrams. Written and overseen by WCRC Executive Director Sandi Formica and Associate Director Matt VanEps, the “Project Overview” begins:

“The stream running through Peek’s Park is a prime candidate for restoration. Several of the stream banks are eroding at the toe of the bank, contributing sediment and nutrients to the stream and preventing a healthy stand of native vegetation from being established. Also, where the site is stable, the vegetative cover is filled with non-native and some invasive species of plants.”

Planning for the restoration began at a meeting last August, with Dave Leisure and Ken Stout of the Winslow Community Development Council meeting with Mayor Randy Jarnagan, John Pennington (Exec. Dir. of BWA), Chad Adams of the Arkansas Highway Department, Sean Sanders of the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission, and Sandi Formica and Matt VanEps of the WCRC.

“Squirrel Branch” runs about 260 feet through the park. The west end is causing erosion, which is about to undermine the road (Winslow Blvd.).

The WCRC is using an 8-ton excavator to lift huge rocks to rebuild the streambed and banks, creating small waterfalls, riffles, and pools to slow down the force of the water. It is common for Sandi and Matt to ask excavator operator Yancy to hoist out rocks weighing several tons if the angle or placement is even ¼” off. They will also be placing natural fiber, biodegradable “coir logs” to fill in the banks and replacing invasive plants with native grasses and plants. The work should be done in early August.

Projects accomplished by the WCRC are truly impressive. They include the following: the Mullins Branch Stream Restoration Project at the U. of A.; the White River Riverbank Stabilization Project; the Restoration of the West Fork White River Airport Site; and the West Fork White River Watershed Project in West Fork. The nice thing is that not only will the “Squirrel Branch Restoration Project” solve the erosion problem, but it will also add a beautiful feature to our picturesque and historic downtown Winslow.

Encaustic Workshop for Beginners

Saturday, October 14, 10:00 AM - 4:00 PM
Presented by Cindy Arsaga

This workshop is for people wishing to learn the basics of encaustic technique. We will focus on equipment, materials, basic techniques, safety, and health precautions.

Encaustic is an ancient technique using beeswax (or other wax medium) and damar resin. The two are combined, brought to a controlled temperature and applied in a molten state to any substrate that will accept the medium.

If you are interested in creating mixed media art, it is convenient for including found objects, papers, organic items, pretty much anything that will allow incorporation with the wax. It also works well when applied to newspaper and photographic images printed on uncoated papers as well as unglazed ceramics.

I will provide various substrates, encaustic medium, oil sticks, and items compatible with wax for inclusion in mixed media pieces. If you wish to bring some of your own items to work with please feel free to do so. The wax will not adhere to anything that resists water.

Please wear clothing that you don't mind getting wax on. Bring your own apron if you have one. I'll provide a few.

Cost is \$125 per person for this full day workshop and is limited to six. Bring a sack lunch and beverages. There is refrigeration on site.

Klein has described the world's long search for a substitute for God: "Somewhere along the way, Western man began to lose his belief in God as a personal force, the decider of his fate, and the ultimate judge of his actions. The idea that God created man became old-fashioned; The notion of hell was picturesque, but no longer compelling..."

So modern man keeps trying all sorts of ineffectual and destructive substitutes for God: Astrology, philosophy, alcohol, drugs, science, paganism, pleasure, etc. But whenever people turn away from God, life turns to chaos. Families disintegrate, the social order collapses, and people make a mess of their lives! There is no substitute for God!

1) Without God There Is No Basis For Decency and Morality. If God is not there, then, as Tolstoy observed in *The Brothers Karamazov*, "all things are permitted!" If Hitler decides to burn 6 million Jews or terrorists blow up a school, how can we say it is wrong if God has not spoken? If we are not created by God, there is nothing sacred about human life!

2) Without God There Is No Meaning In Life Or Reason For Existence. Man becomes, as one eminent evolutionist expressed it, merely "a biological accident created by nature without purpose, to be obliterated without regret."

3) Without God There Is No Explanation For The Universe. How can anyone contemplate the eye of a horsefly... the mechanics of human finger movement... the incredible complexity of the nucleus of a cell... or the vast order of the universe and say it all happened by sheer, bumbling, unguided chance. To believe that is to believe in a miracle far more astounding than any in the Bible!

4) Without God We Are Without Hope. David Klein notes, "In freeing himself of the terror of hell, (modern man) gave up the hope of heaven: you live, you die, that's the end of it..." God is "the God of all hope." (Romans 15.13.) Without Him there is no hope. For life to have meaning, God must be there.

There is no substitute for God!


