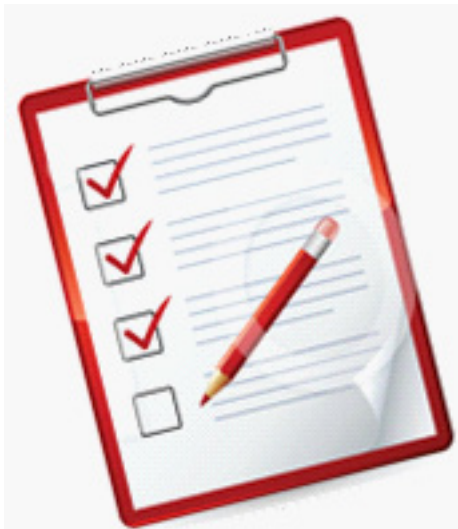
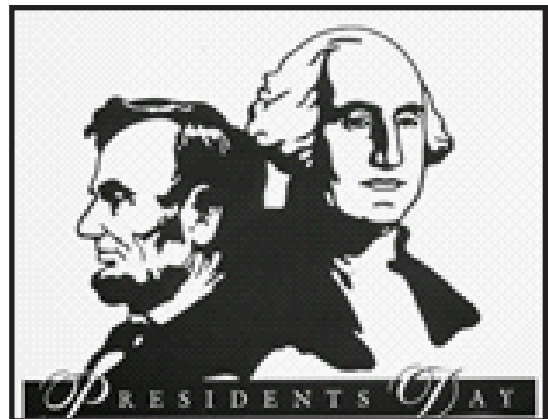

The 30-Day Simplicity Challenge for the New Year

The following is PART II from the Simplicity Planner. Last month I covered the first five and here is the second group. The Simplicity Change is a 30-day challenge toward achieve a simpler, more joyful life. According to the planner, each task should take less than 15 minutes to complete. However, I thought it would be good to start with five each month, add another five to keep from being overwhelmed. I promised, some of these take more than 15 minutes – at least in my house and life. Good luck and have fun!

FEBRUARY 2020

1. Restock pantry staples (with longer shelf lives) that need to be restocked. (I include trash bags, paper towels, canned green beans, corn, oil, etc. – especially useful in bad weather).
2. Walk your house with a donate bag. Self-schedule a pick-up or drop it off as soon as the bag is full. (In our case – next time you go into Fayetteville, take time to drop the items off at the Goodwill or some similar place that can use your donation. Make sure the items are donation worthy. If you would not keep them for yourself – throw them away rather than try and give them away).
3. Start the habit of throwing a small load of laundry in every morning. (This is a tough habit for me but would be a really good one to get into, that way my laundry basket would not pile up so much).
4. Set a recurring alarm for every weekday. If you're letting your kids wake you, set it for one hour earlier.
5. Go put gas in your car today. While you're there, clean out your car. Throw trash away. (This is my favorite as I seldom let my tank get below ½ full and it really bothers me to have a trashy vehicle. The trash can is right there when you are filling up the tank, why not use it?)

I. Why the City of Winslow needs the funds from a sales and use tax.

- A. long-postponed repair of streets, shoulders, ditches, and culverts
- B. maintenance and improvements to City Hall, Winslow Museum, Winslow School bldg., etc.
 - 1. specific needs (materials and labor):
 - a. **City Hall and Winslow Museum**
 - flood prevention
 - improving the bathroom and fixing electrical wiring
 - restoring mortar, repairing, and reroofing
 - b. **Winslow School rock building**
 - restoring mortar, structural work, replace windows, roofing, flooring, electrical.
 - c. **Winslow's parks and gardens:** maintain (invest in a mower)
 - Peek's Park, Tunnel Park, Frisco Pavilion, Welcome Rock (or "Y") Park, Ball Park, Ball Park Pavilion, concession stand, Winfest Stage, ball fields, lawns, Winslow Meals

II. How a 2% sales and use tax would affect us.

- A. Sales Tax breakdown for the cities in Washington County
 - 1. **Winslow is the only city in Washington County with no tax.**
 - 2. for example: Greenland is 3%; West Fork 3%; Prairie Grove 2.75%; and Farmington 2%.
- B. The estimated income from a 2% tax from Winslow businesses may be about \$30,000/yr.
- C. As it stands now, area residents outside the city limits--and those just passing through--benefit from city services and events, but don't help finance them. The 2% sales tax would change that!

The benefits from this sales tax would mainly be paid by the approximately 3500 folks who live in the Winslow area just OUTSIDE our city limits, and by those who travel through!

They would continue to benefit from the improved services and events provided and supported both directly and indirectly by the City of Winslow, including city roads, water service, City Hall information and public assistance, annual area cleanup efforts, the Winslow Library, the Winslow Museum, the Winslow Community Meals program, the Winslow Community Center and its events, the July 4th Fireworks, the annual Christmas Parade, the Winslow Run fundraising event for area nonprofits, the first Saturday recycling program, Winfest, and the Winslow Farmers' Market.

III. Imagine what it would be like if Winslow's city government ceased to exist or had no money with which to work.

Could we count on Washington County government to care about our streets, our parks, our community center, and the other services and the events that are so much part of our community?

Your vote on Tuesday, March 3rd FOR the Winslow sales and use tax is not a vote to change Winslow, it is a vote to keep things that make our town special!

Winslow Arbor Day Celebration and Native Tree Seedlings Giveaway Saturday, March 7

In 2016, Winslow was awarded recognition as a Tree City USA. Every year since then, the City and volunteers have done projects to maintain this status, like planting trees in Peek's Park, Tunnel Park, the Winslow Ball Park, the Ball Park median near the highway, and at the new Dollar General Store. Also, volunteers have spent many Saturdays digging up kudzu.

But one of the best efforts has been doing the Winslow Arbor Day Celebration and Native Tree Seedlings Giveaway!

This year, the event will take place on Saturday, March 7.

From 9 am until we run out, we will give away free native tree and shrubs . At 10:30 am, Mayor Chuck Dwyer will deliver the 4th Annual Winslow Arbor Day Proclamation. Hot coffee, hot chocolate, and homemade baked goods from our Farmers' Market vendors will be available at the Mercantile across the street.

This year, the event will be on Saturday, March 7th, starting at 9 am (until they are gone) across from City Hall outside the Train Pavilion. Seedlings of native trees and shrubs will be given out to folks from the greater Winslow area. They include: Buttonbush, Chinkapin Oak, Kentucky Coffeetree, Ohio Buckeye, Redbud, River Birch, Spicebush, Sycamore, Washington Hawthorn, and possibly, Paw Paw.

As in the past, tree expert Nate Weston of the Beaver Watershed Alliance will be there to discuss the importance of planting native plants and why they are far more beneficial for the insects, birds, and animals than are invasive species. Also, they tend to grow better here.

Barn cats available at Washington County Animal Shelter

Washington County Animal Shelter is a participant in the Trap/Neuter/Release (TNR) Feral Cat (also known as Barn Cats) Program. This program is available to residents of Washington County within the jurisdiction (not Fayetteville or Springdale). Eligible residents can borrow a humane trap to safely catch their feral cats, get them altered, and have the cat vaccinated for rabies as long as they are willing to take the cat back. Contact the Washington County Animal Shelter to see if you qualify for the program or to ask to be put on the list for when they have some Barn Cats that need to be adopted out.



Remember, this is not for your own personal sweet kitties, it's for feral, working cats ONLY.

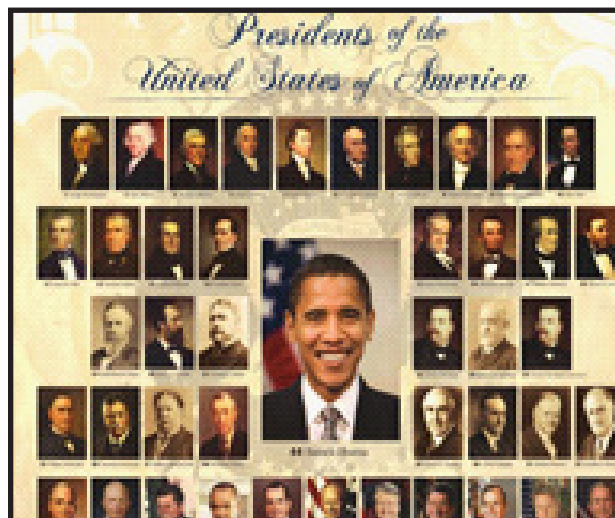

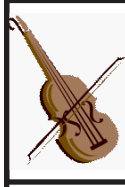

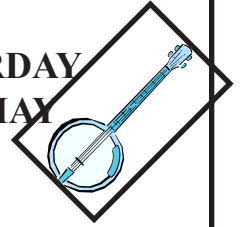

BANISHING CHRIST TO THE CELLAR

Jesus said: "No one after lighting a lamp, puts it away in a cellar... but on the lampstand, in order that those who enter may see the light." (Luke 11.33.) On another occasion, He explained that He had come into the world so that men might not "remain in darkness." (John 12.46.) His "coming into the world enlightens every man." (John 1.9.)

Our task is to enshrine the light of Christ in our hearts and reflect His glory to a sin-darkened world. But many, instead of placing Christ on the lampstand of their lives, have banished Him to the cellar!!! This is true in a number of ways...

1) In Our Churches. Christ has been driven out of the pulpits of many churches and locked up in the basement! Their preaching is no longer focused on "Jesus Christ and Him crucified." (1 Corinthians 2.2.) His teaching is no longer central to their faith. His light has been relegated to the cellar to be replaced by the artificial illumination of human opinion, pop psychology, and entertaining chatter.

2) In Our Homes. Christ is never mentioned in many homes! There is no evidence of His presence on display — no religious books on the shelves, no well-used Bible on the table, no Christian art on display. It is deeply disturbing to enter a home to find unwholesome programs running on TV, or to see lewd literature laying around. Is Christ on the lampstand in your Home?

3) In Our Conversation. What do you talk about most naturally and most often? Spiritual things or worldly themes? What is predominant in your speech? Profanity...? Gossip...? Dirty jokes...? God's name taken in vain...? If the influence of Christ is to shine from the lampstand of our lives, then we must live by this rule: "Let no unwholesome word proceed out of your mouth..." (Ephesians 4.29.)

4) In Our Conduct. Is the influence of Jesus obvious in our daily lives? (Galatians 2.20.) Peter urges, "Keep your behavior excellent among the Gentiles, so that... they may on account of your good deeds, as they observe them, glorify God." (1 Peter 2.12.) Christ's influence must be taken from the cellar and placed where it belongs — on the lampstand!

It doesn't make sense to light a lamp and hide it away in the cellar. Nor does it make sense to remove Christ from the center of our lives!
